Foundation Awards \$2,250 Grant

This June the Foundation was excited to award its first ever research grant to Adam Oswalt of Select Sires in Plain City, OH. Adam received the grant at the breed's annual meeting on June 27, 2014 in Peoria, IL.



"This \$2,250 grant is the beginning of the U.S. Ayrshire Breeders Foundation making good on its mission of working for the enhancement

of the U.S. Ayrshire Breeders Association, its cattle, its membership and its youth," explains Foundation Committee Treasurer, Sharon Tentinger. "Needless to say it is an exciting day, and only the first of many."

Adam's project focuses on increasing genomic prediction reliability. The goal

is to increase the Ayrshire genotype and phenotype reference population to boost reliability of young animal genomic evaluations, and potentially refine or discover detrimental breed haplotypes.

Genomic research, especially on older animals, will be a critical factor in the future success of the Ayrshire breed. This is one of the main reasons that the

Foundation was formed. The Association does not have the funds or the resources to award research grants. Many other breeds have Foundations and it was time for the Ayrshires to have one of their own.

Gold Charter Member, Tom Gillette,

owner of Kler-Vu Farm says, "The Foundation will open many doors to the future and exciting new genetic pathways for the Ayrshire breed."

Adam's genomic tests will be conducted on 50-50 registered Ayrshire cows with two or more milking daughters using the GP2 genomic profiler chip. The requirements for the cows participating are:

- Registered in the ABA herd book
- Sired by A.I. bull from the U.S. or Canada
- DHI monthly records for no less than two complete lactations
- Type classified
- Minimum of two milking daughters also on DHI test and preferably A.I. sired.

Stay tuned to future issues of the *Foundation Flyer* to learn about the results of Adam's research.

Giving That Grows: Grants Support Critical Research

E ach year the Foundation accepts and reviews proposals for research to advance knowledge about the Ayrshire breed, or solve a current problem facing breeders.

Proposals are evaluated based on the criteria of merit, competence and relevance. Genomic testing of animals is a current research priority.


Proposals are accepted between January 1st and May 15th and should be submitted to the secretary of the Foundation Committee.

The Committee then holds a meeting to review all proposals. Applicants are invited to attend the meeting and may also present their proposal via PowerPoint.

As reported above, this year the Foundation awarded \$2,250. As we raise more funds, we will be able to raise the

amount that we have available to award for research grants.

All of the funds we raise go into the Foundation's investment account. At the end of the year we determine the earnings.



Five percent of the earnings will be used to award grants.

As an example if the account earned

10%, 5% of that will go toward a grant and the remaining 5% will be re-invested back into the account.

If we have a slower year and the account only earns 3%, then that 3% will be used for a grant. By doing this we can continually grow the principal balance and increase the funds available for grants. This will sustain the account for many years to come.

Keeping It In The Family: Past, Present and Future

John Rodgers, and daughter Audrey Gay, committed to Ayrshires for 60 years and continuing

John Reed Rodgers has been passionate about promoting and breeding Ayrshires since 1951. John's Uncle Reed influenced him early in his life as he taught John about cows and horses.

John has written a book detailing his life with Ayrshires, *An Ayrshire Adventure, Sixty-three Years And Continuing*. In 2012 he was inducted into the PA Ayrshire Hall of Fame. The award was proudly presented to him by his daughter, Audrey Gay.

Audrey Gay inherited a love of Ayrshires from her father and today she runs a farm camp for 8-14 year-old city girls. The camp is called Hameau Farm For Girls.

In the 1980s John's Plum Bottom herd was moved to Hameau Farm For Girls where they remain today. They continue to show well and produce quality milk.

The Past

In the early days as John's herd grew, so did his family and he began to make a living breeding and milking Ayrshires.

"Those were interesting days. Our family was beginning to grow and as I look back they were very satisfying times," John says. "It was hard work, the learning curve for me was straight up."


John learned eagerly from other farmers and breeders around him. He worked to refine his techniques and maximize his resources. His farm was named Plum Bottom and was located in Belleville, PA.

Some of his early cattle were direct from Scotland including Logan Mains Ina 2nd and Logan Mains Favorite 2nd.

As John's interest in Ayrshires deepened, he was voted secretary of the PA State Association and started holding field days at Plum Bottom farm, a tradition learned from his Uncle Reed.

Throughout the years John found himself in various business ventures, but he was always drawn back to Avrshires.

He took a trip to Scotland with his wife and mother to learn more about his own roots as well as the roots of Ayrshires. While there he had the idea to exchange U.K. Ayrshires semen with those in the United States.

Through this effort Ardrossan E.V. Kate's Trident was discovered. Trident went on to become the bull known around the world. Interestingly, prior to John coming along, Trident was almost sent to the butcher because he was being unruly!

John continued to travel and promote the Ayrshire breed. He moved up in the ranks of the Ayrshire Association, eventually becoming President.

John eventually stopped dairy farming and turned his focus to raising Ayrshires specifically to sell for breeding. This program was called "Raised to Graze." He says the best part about the program was that it brought together people from different places who all had one thing in common—Ayrshires.

The Future

Today, John consults with his daughter to develop the families that have proven to produce outstanding Ayrshires. He also currently serves on the U.S. Ayrshire Breeders Foundation Committee.

John believes that as everyone works together through the Association and the Foundation, the future is looking bright for the Ayrshire breed.


